### Head of Year 12

#### Dear Parents and Carers,

The torrential rain couldn't dampen our end of term fun last week when our sports day had to be cancelled at very short notice. Open Study was a sight to behold -150 Year 12 pupils, eyes down, playing Bingo for prizes-the tension in the room was palpable! Bingo was followed by a buffet lunch with a bit of an ad

hoc sing-song added for good measure! Staff and pupils commented that it was a lovely way to bring the year group together at the end of a hectic year.

Our Higher Education and Post 18 Options Drop Down Day a couple of weeks ago, was a huge success. All Year 12 pupils attended a series of workshops and seminars led by members of the 6<sup>th</sup> Form Team and guest speakers. Presentations included Queen Mary's University on 'How to make effective course choices and what to expect as a student' and 'Fees, Loans and Finance for pupils' by The University of East Anglia. The latter presentation clarified the Student Loan system and process and explained that a university degree shouldn't be a barrier to anyone on the grounds on finance.

It was great to see the return of three of our Alumni pupils (all currently studying or graduating from top universities) return to answer questions generated by our Year 12s relating to university and university life. Questions ranged from 'what has the transition been like from school to university' to 'how have you coped with cooking for yourself'! Many of our pupils commented that it was really useful to receive 'real world' tips from young people their age.

We were very fortunate to have Claire Kinselly, leading careers coach, join us for the Drop Down Day. Claire led Personal Statement workshops for the year group looking at how to write a successful Personal Statement and broke down the structure and content of this important element to UCAS applications.

All Year 12s now have been registered for UCAS. Over Summer I would urge all pupils to write at least a first draught of their Personal Statement. All resources to support with this can be found on Google Classrooms HE, Careers and Post 18 Options page (see below) and of course Unifrog is an invaluable support for writing Personal statements too. As you will know from previous Herons, all pupils have a Unifrog account and this will remain accessible over summer too.

We have issued all Year 12 pupils a hard copy of our booklet 'University Admissions for Pupils and Parents' which was previously given to you in person during our HE Parent Information Evening in March. The booklet contains valuable information, reminders and a range of further links. Please do keep the booklet in a safe place as it will contain answers to the many questions you may have.

#### New 'Higher Education, careers and Post 18 Options' Google Classroom Page

We have created a new Google Classroom page entitled HE, Careers and Post 18 Options that pupils and parents can refer to throughout the forthcoming year. The Google Classroom is now live and can be accessed using code zj5tbhq. Here you will find lots of very useful parent and student guides and key materials including 'How to make a competitive application to university' and 'How to write a Personal Statement'.

#### **Early Applicants**

Pupils have already been invited to make themselves known if they would like to make an Early Application to UCAS e.g. they intend to apply to Oxford, Cambridge or apply for Medicine, Dentistry or Veterinary Science. If your child decides over the summer holidays that they are now interested in making an early application, please can you ask them to speak to Ms van Beers on their immediate return to school in September. I would recommend Early Applicants research Pre-Admission exam requirements (if any) and it would be advantageous for pupils to start to work through past papers. Many of the Pre-Admission exams can be sat at school and this can be arranged first week back via the Exams Office. All Early Applicants should have a draught of their Personal Statement ready by 11th September as we will be visited by Dr Hugh Munroe from Wadham College, Oxford who will be running an editing workshop for them. Please be advised that we have the following deadlines for UCAS

#### **External deadline dates**

**2<sup>nd</sup> October 2023,** 18:00 (UK time) – for music conservatoires

**16<sup>th</sup> October 2023,** 18:00 (UK time) – for Oxbridge, medicine, dentistry and veterinary courses

**31<sup>st</sup> January 2024,** 18:00 (UK time) – the main UCAS deadline for the majority of all other courses.

Some art and design courses are later and depend on the institution.

#### **Internal Deadline Dates**

To ensure that we can support you with completing your UCAS application and have time to check through for errors, we set internal deadline dates for pupils.

**Friday 22<sup>nd</sup> September 2023** - Wanstead Internal UCAS application deadline for Medicine, Dentistry, Veterinary Science, Oxford or Cambridge applicants.

Friday 3<sup>rd</sup> November 2023 – Wanstead Internal UCAS application deadline for all other applicants.

1st week of December 2023 - Oxbridge interviews

The aim is to ensure all applications are sent before the Christmas break as universities begin sending out offers in November.

#### **Summer Study**

It is really important to keep subject knowledge refreshed and maintained over the summer holidays as well as furthering knowledge through super curricular projects. All subjects will have set holiday homework, assignments or revision-it is vital these tasks are completed as pupils will have further tests and mocks in the new term.

# **Information for Results day**

A level results day is **Thursday 17 August 2023**. Your Head of Year and the Sixth Form team will be around to support you on this day.

If you are unable to collect your results, you will need to nominate someone to collect on your behalf and will need to send the name of that person to the exams team or your Head of Year (Ms Battiwala).

#### Tracking and replying to offers

In Track, a student can hold up to two offers. Once they have received all offers, they must select their choices.

Firm – their first choice. If they meet the conditions of the offer they will be placed

Insurance – acts as a back-up choice if they are not placed with their firm choice

#### UCAS EXTRA

Extra is available between February and July.

If pupils don't get offers from any of their choices, they may be able to use Extra.

Applicants are eligible for Extra if:

- they have used all five choices
- all their choices were unsuccessful, canceled, or they declined their offers

#### If using Extra:

- there is no option for an insurance choice
- the universities have 21 days to respond
- an applicant's existing Apply information is used

#### Prepare for results day

Results day can be stressful, so make sure you know how it works and what to expect.

- Have your UCAS application sign in details handy and update your contact details if you need to on your online application.
- Make sure you're available on results day and contactable because UCAS cannot speak to anyone else about your application details unless you give them nominated access to speak on your behalf.
- Check how your exam results get to your universities/ colleges – most come directly to UCAS from the awarding organisations, and we send them on to your choices. But if not, you just send your exam results to your universities or colleges yourself. Check this link for any exams not directly received by UCAS: https://www.ucas.com/undergraduate/ clearing-and-results-day/results-day/sending-exam-results

#### What UCAS will do with your results

1. First UCAS will match them to exam entry records and to the qualifications you list on your application.

#### If your application info doesn't match your results, there might be a delay in the outcome of your offer.

2. Then they will send them on to the unis, colleges, and conservatoires you're holding offers with.

Generally, it's only the overall result that UCAS process and pass on, but there are some exceptions. For A levels, they include the unit grades as well as your overall grade.

#### Clearing (if your grades do not meet the grade requirements of your firm or insurance choices)

- Lists of courses with vacancies in Clearing are published from the beginning of July until late September in our search tool – www.ucas.com/search
- Check the lists for suitable courses, then contact universities and colleges to find out more about the course, and see if they will offer them a place. You must do this yourself – admissions tutors want to speak to them, not their parents or teachers.
- Applicants can apply for any course that has places left. They don't have to keep to the same subjects they first applied for.
- The applicant must have permission from the university or college before they add a Clearing choice in their application. If they don't, their application may be delayed.
- If an applicant originally had an offer and wants to decline their place and go into Clearing, they can release themselves in their application.

If a student has individual support needs, they should mention this in any Clearing conversation to arrange any support they may need. Once a Clearing choice has been added, the applicant cannot change it until the university or college has made a decision. If they're accepted, they are firmly committed to that course. If the applicant is unsuccessful, they can repeat the process.

#### **Clearing process:**

- 1. Track confirms applicant eligibility, and provides a Clearing number (six digits).
- 2. Applicants have a ten-digit Personal ID (PID), and should be able to quote this and their Clearing number when calling Universities.
- 3. An adviser email is sent to schools/colleges identifying those in Clearing.
- 4. On A level results day, the 'Add Clearing choice' button appears from 15:00 (UK time) for eligible applicants.

#### Clearing Plus (If you did not meet the entry requirements of your firm and insurance places

If you're eligible, you'll see a button in your online application called 'See matches'. Once you hit that, you'll be able to see a full list of your matches. If you express an interest in a course, that university or college can contact you.


Remember, courses in Clearing fill up quickly, and you may not always receive a call, so we recommend you also keep your options open and look for courses using Clearing.

Here's an example of how it works. Just remember, the matches are individual to you.

- Rosie receives her exam results.
- Unfortunately, they weren't the grades she needed for her firm or insurance choices.
- Rosie signs in to her application. She sees a 'See matches' button. Once she clicks it there's a list of her top 50 matches based on her original choices.
  - She clicks 'interested' on four of her matches.
  - She gets a call from one of them. They ask her some questions about why she'd like to study the course and is offered a place.
  - Rosie adds the course as a Clearing choice and is off to uni. <u>OR</u> She does not choose any matches and uses the clearing search tool to look for other Universities and con tacts them directly.


# **Preparing for the Future**




# Year Group Sports Afternoons


# METROPOLITAN POLICE



Safer schools officers are here to develop positive relationships between young people and the Police. We provide visible reassurance before, during and after school. We work alongside the school and parents in early intervention, preventing young people becoming either victims or perpetrators of crime.

#### What is "Robbery"?

Under Section 8 of the Theft Act 1968, a person will be guilty of the criminal offence of robbery if they steal, and immediately before or at the time of doing so, and to do so, they use force on any person or puts or seeks to put any person in fear of being then and there subjected to force.

#### Fearless

Fearless is the dedicated youth service of the independent charity Crimestoppers. They provide you with the opportunity to give information about crime 100% anonymously.

You can give information to them by using their online form (https://crimestoppers-uk.org/fearless/what-is-fearless/who-we-are) or by calling Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111

They cannot track your IP address or your phone number. They have no way of knowing who has contacted them.

After receiving your completed form or your call, they will create a report, ensuring it doesn't contain any information that could identify you, and generate a report which is then sent on to the relevant authority with the legal responsibility to review the information that has been passed to them.

### HERE'S 3 THINGS YOU CAN DO:

 Your phone will have security features such as a passcode or fingerprint/ face ID. Make sure you use it to protect access to your phone.

Tracker apps can help locate your phone if it's lost or stolen. Ask a parent to show you how to set one up.

Record the phone's IMEI number in a seperate place at home. Find this by typing in \*#06#. You'll need to give this number to police if it's stolen.

# STREET ROBBERY

Robbery is when force is used or threatened to steal items. Thieves often target people who are distracted, so keeping your valuables including your mobile phone and other devices hidden ensures you're more alert.

#### HOW CAN I STAY SAFE?

- When out and about be aware of your surroundings.
- Stay alert when walking along the road for criminals who might use bikes/mopeds or e-scooters to snatch phones/valuables.
- Try not to walk along with your phone or valuables on show.
- Earbuds/Headphones can be a distraction.
- Plan your route and use forms of transport that others are using and avoid shortcuts in isolated places.

#### **IF YOU ARE A VICTIM**

Crime prevention advice can help reduce your chances of being robbed, but it may still happen to you. It can be a frightening experience and leave you feeling worried afterwards, especially if you felt threatened or violence was used. Talking to a parent or adult you trust can help.

#### Protect yourself from Mobile Phone theft

Don't leave your phone, iPad, tablet or camera unattended, out of your sight, or left on a table. Thieves can grab a phone from a table in seconds.

Be aware of your surroundings and only use your mobile when it feels safe to.

When you've finished using it, put it away.



As police officers, our job is to keep you safe and stop people who want to steal property like phones, cash, earphones and even expensive coats or trainers.

You can help us do that by being careful where you use your phone and taking care of cash and other valuable items.

- Don't fight back, it's not worth the risk when a phone can be replaced.
- Tell us if someone robs you or tries to. It's important you get help straight away by dialling 999 using a friend or trus ted adult's phone rather than contacting police when you get home. This gives us the best chance to catch the suspects, recover stolen items and make sure you're safe.

#### KEEPING YOU AND YOUR PHONE SAFE

Getting a phone is really exciting. You can stay in touch with friends out more about world.

#### **5 TIPS TO KEEP SAFE**

- Keep your phone and valuables out of sight and in a safe place. Take care when you take them out especially near bus stops and train stations.
- Stay alert and remember earp hones/headphones can distract you from being aware of someone approaching from behind you. Thieves can approach on mopeds, e-scooters and pedal cycles.

- Memorise or keep a note of a parenit/carer's phone number an a separate place in case of emergency.

High standards of uniform and personal appearance can make a valuable contribution to the self-confidence of individual pupils and the professionalism of the school community as a whole.

**Required Items Year 7 - 11** 

#### Description

Burgundy school blazer with school badge	-	Blazers must be worn to and from school. They must be worn at all times around the school site and in lessons unless given permission by their class teacher in class or by a whole school announcement during periods of ex- tremely hot weather, when they may be carried or left at home in exceptional circumstances.
School tie	-	All pupils must wear a school tie. Ties can be purchased from school via ParentPay or from our uniform retailer. A pupil's year group is identifiable by the colour of the stripe on their tie. The stripe must be visible at all times.
White plain school shirt	-	Top button must be done up. Shirts can be long or short-sleeved.
Black tailored school trousers or black tailored school shorts (summer term only)	-	Trousers and shorts must be school-style and not be skinny or tight-fitting. No leggings, jeans or denim.
Black knee-length school skirt	-	Skirts must be school-style and not be skinny or tight-fitting. Skirts must not be rolled up.
Black v-neck long-sleeved plain pullover (op- tional)	-	No sweatshirts, no cardigans and no logos apart from school badge. Pullovers do not have to have the school badge if worn.
Black leather shoes with black soles and black laces	-	Smart, flat boots to the ankle may be worn. No Dr. Martens boots, no trainers, no high heels, no canvas shoes, no coloured laces (except when sold in school for LGBQT+ awareness). Nike Air Force or similar are not a suitable school shoe.
White or black socks	-	Must be worn up to or below the knee and no patterns.
Flesh tone or plain black tights (optional)	-	No patterns and tights must not be torn or ripped.
Outdoor coat (optional)	-	Appropriate coat suitable for school. Unzipped whilst in the school building. Hoodies or tracksuit tops may not be worn instead of a coat.

Formal fit suit	-	Should be smart and professional, ID badges must be worn at all times.
Formal collared shirt with tie or business style blouse	-	Top button must be done up. Shirts can be long or short-sleeved.
Formal fit skirt or dress (professional length) with business style blazer	-	Should be smart and professional, ID badges must be worn at all times
Black leather-style shoes	-	Formal flat or low-heeled shoes or sensible, practical, flat or low-heeled for- mal boots can be worn but must be covered under the trousers or no higher than ankle length.
V-neck plain formal jumper/cardigan can also be worn	-	Must show a collared shirt and tie/blouse underneath.

All items of logoed uniform can be purchased from Carolina School Outfitters. https://carolinaschooloutfitters.co.uk/ Other items can be bought from any other appropriate establishment. This will be reviewed in 2023-24. Children coming to school in unacceptable uniform will be supplied with the correct uniform from the Reflection Centre. Pupils are asked to leave a deposit (an article of minor value) whilst school property is being borrowed.

In cases of financial need, parents can apply to the school for assistance towards the cost of school clothing.

#### Item Description

Jewellery - Jewellery worn to school should be safe and appropriate.

Pupils may wear up to two small stud earrings in each ear and one small nose stud may also be worn. Hoop or drop earrings of any size are not permitted. No other body or facial piercings should be displayed.

- Pupils may wear a watch; smart watches are not permitted in exams or assessments.

# Make Up - Make-up needs to be subtle and nail varnish can be worn. Heavy make-up, false eyelashes and fake nails are considered inappropriate for school and a distraction from the purpose of school, they are not permitted in Years 7-11.

Hair - Pupils must wear their hair in a natural colour, bright unnatural colours are not permitted. Extreme hair styles or those associated with any kind of anti-social activities or groups are not permitted. These change from time to time and the Headteacher reserves the right to specify what these might be at any point.

The patterned shaving of hair or eyebrows is forbidden.

- Wanstead High School has adopted the Halo Code. This means our school champions the right of staff and pupils to embrace all Afro-hairstyles. We welcome Afro-textured hair worn in all styles including, but not limited to, afros, locs, twists, braids, cornrows, fades, hair straightened through the application of heat or chemicals, weaves, wigs and headscarves, as long as they are in line with school colours and hair colour guidance.

This does not include durags or bonnets which are not appropriate in school.

Hoodies and other non-uniform jumpers or coats - Hooded sports tops or 'hoodies' are not permitted and will be confiscated. Only a black v-neck jumper may be worn in school, this does not have to be logoed. Dance or Drama hoodies are only allowed for extra-curricular activities.

Hats, Ski Masks, Balaclavas, Face coverings -

It is not permitted for any pupil to wear any form of cap or hat in the school building. A woollen hat can be worn to and from school and at break/lunch-times when the weather is cold. Ski masks, balaclavas and face coverings should not be worn, to, from or within school.
