### Welcome from the Headteacher

Dear Parents/Carers,

I hope you are enjoying the break and your children are giving you enough peace to be able to find time to read about the exciting activities and events that just keep happening at Wanstead High. It has been great to see so many Year 11s and 13s in school this week engaging in the Easter School and again thank you to my staff for their commitment to supporting our pupils. There is a huge amount to read about in this issue and none of these things could happen without the staff, but also your commitment and the energy and engagement of the pupils — I thank all of you who play a part in this excellent community.

The building work continues and it is fascinating to read Riku's article – it is good to be reminded of the end product as the building phase is making life much more challenging for everyone on the site – our staff and pupils are incredibly resilient as they have to get used to new routes and one-way systems, as well as experiencing the relentless banging and crashing! I am also hoping the building will be finished earlier than Riku's prediction – hopefully closer to 2024/25 but I understand the current reluctance to commit.

You will be aware that there are further strikes likely to affect our pupils and we will do all we can to respect what is being fought for, whilst ensuring we can put on some education for our pupils; on Thursday 27<sup>th</sup> April and Tuesday 2<sup>nd</sup> May, our exam groups will take top priority and further details will follow.

You will notice a number of vacancies in the coming weeks for job roles and we hope we can find a way through the challenges of recruitment, especially in an outer London borough – a teacher starting in Barking and Dagenham, for example, classed as Inner London, will earn over £2000 more a year than the starting salary in Redbridge. We are optimistic that we have strategically planned early enough to find the best teachers out there but this will be a roller coaster ride until the start of the academic school year 2023-24. I am delighted to say we have recruited an excellent Head of Media and new Assistant Head last week – therefore making an excellent start to recruitment. We will update you as and when of leavers and starters.

We welcome some new staff as you know from the information in the In Touch Bulletin and welcome them all to the school – I am sure they will learn to love this community as much as we do.

The media coverage of Ofsted is fascinating and we read it with interest, especially as our Ofsted window is open! I do hope that a solution can be found to hold schools to account and raise standards but in a supportive and not punitive way – we will watch what unfolds.

Enjoy the warmer weather and your family time over the next week or so. We do have some challenges ahead, but we always try and find some humour and smiles in the situation:

As Herman Melville said in Moby Dick,

Dear Parents and Carers.

Our Year 10 pupils really enjoyed the recent assembly and workshop delivered by the 'fix up' Team. The assembly focused on having a positive mind set and helping pupils believe in themselves. It was great to see so many pupils getting involved and even taking the opportunity to stand up

and speak about their future aspirations and how they are going to achieve them.

I would like to congratulate Tutor Group 10.2 on delivering an assembly to the rest of the Year group on 'International Women's Day'. They worked hard in the lead up to the assembly and ensured key messages were advertised - Well done 10.2!

Please be reminded all Year 10 pupils should have full Wanstead High P.E kit and pupils must bring trainers for every P.E lesson. Football tops, hooded jackets and other sports clothes are not allowed. Year 10 pupils continue to have 2 hours of practical P.E every week and should be organised with the correct P.E kit.

As we head towards the final summer term, I would like to inform you all about our upcoming Year 10 GCSE Mock exams which will begin on Monday 12<sup>th</sup> June through to Friday 23<sup>rd</sup> June. I will be sending home a more detailed letter regarding support for your child and further arrangements. This is the first real experience of sitting in the exam hall facing full test papers. This will be a nervous time for all so it is important that we start preparing now. It is vital that we revise but that we do it in the most effective way.

During tutor time, after the Easter break, we will be focusing on creating a clear revision timetable and ways in which to prepare and revise for the examinations.

The year group will be introduced to the idea of 20-minute revision sessions. If pupils were to have 2 of these sessions per day, then they'd be able to revise all their GCSE subjects in a week – keeping the regular checking and practicing of knowledge and skills but in a way that isn't overwhelming. This means 12 weeks of revision before their mocks that will ensure the subject knowledge is secure and give pupils the best possible chance for the exams. What is equally important is to ensure that we reduce any anxiety pupils will naturally feel in the build up to exams by keeping the revision sessions shorter and more manageable.

There will also be a "How to revise" guide on the school website and on our year group Google Classroom page.

#### **Head of Year 12**

Dear Parents and Carers,

It was fantastic to see our Year 12 parents at our Higher Education Evening on 28<sup>th</sup> March when we had an opportunity to go through ways of supporting your child with the Post 18 application process. We were very fortunate to have pres-

entations from Imperial College London, who discussed tips for applying for competitive places and The University of East Anglia who explained student finance and funding. In addition, I spoke about and demonstrated Unifrog, our Post 18 'destinations platform'. The full presentation from the evening, including parent login details for Unifrog, can be accessed on our school website under the Sixth Form tab.

You should be, by now, in receipt of your child's Term 2 report. With the predicted grade on the report, it would be a valuable exercise for you and your child to use Unifrog's 'UK Universities Tool' and 'Apprenticeship Tool' to begin to explore exciting destination possibilities.

Last week the year group had a Civil Service Drop Down Day at school with representatives from the Civil Service who set out to demystify stereotypes. The day started with keynote speakers followed by the chance for pupils to 'meet and greet' members of the cabinet office who answered questions. Many of our pupils commented that they hadn't appreciated the wide range of Civil Service departments and were impressed by the varied and structured entry routes on offer including Apprenticeships. I've put a useful link to Civil Service careers on our Year 12 Google Classroom page for further perusal.

Our Year 12 aspiring medics were lucky enough to be recently visited by Dr Bowe, an alumni student who generously made time from his hectic schedule to spend

the afternoon with them. He delivered an excellent presentation on preparing for specialist exams for medical entry; boosting university applications with super curricular activities; medical work experience and gave pupils the low down on what to expect as a medical student. I have shared his resources on our Year 12 Google Classroom page for further reference.

The Summer Term of Year 12 will prove to be a busy one as our pupils start to refine ideas for post 18 pathways. We have already made plans to take the year group to the Higher Education Fair at the University of East London where they will get a chance to meet face to face with over 100 representatives from universities, colleges and apprenticeship providers. Towards the end of June we have planned a whole cohort visit to a leading London university alongside a school based drop down day which will focus on writing outstanding personal statements for university.

For those pupils not wishing to apply to university we will be organising an alternative programme of events in the summer term to include guest speakers from apprenticeship schemes, gap year and volunteering organisations.

As you will know by now, our Year 12 Mock exams will be held on the 12<sup>th</sup> to the 22<sup>nd</sup> June. I know that our conscientious pupils will use the Easter Holidays to start their revision schedule. I have posted on our Year 12 Google Classroom page an electronic study planner which allows the user to list and tick off each component for revision. I would, however, also like to encourage pupils to make time over the holidays to relax, spend time with family and friends and generally recharge batteries so they can tackle the last term of Year 12 with gusto on their return.

## Walton-on-the-Naze fieldwork



From a geological perspective, the soft cliffs contain numerous fossilised shells and sharks teeth ranging from 5 to 45 million years old. Unfortunately the poor weather hampered our search for these although shells and fossilised wood were found.

Once back in our warm dry classroom, the class will be plotting and analysing the data collected on the day and evaluating the effectiveness of the defences at Walton.

This fieldwork fits closely with the module 'Coastal landscapes and change' which focuses heavily on the effects of climate change on our coasts. We have studied impacts of coastal erosion and sea level rise at various global locations but this trip showed we are facing similar challenges along many of our UK coastlines too.







On Tuesday 14<sup>th</sup> March our Year 13 Geography pupils travelled to a cold, wet and windy Walton-on-the-Naze on the Essex coast. Walton provides an excellent opportunity for geographers to view and contrast areas of managed and unmanaged coastline. Managed coastline involves the use of structures such as sea walls to protect the land behind, unmanaged has no protection and is at the mercy of the elements.

Like many stretches of the Anglian coastline, the cliffs at Walton are made up of very soft materials; layers of clay, sand and mud make them very susceptible to erosion and weathering. The result is rapid retreat of unprotected cliffs, currently this is around 2 metres per year.

While on site, our pupils collected contrasting data from the two sites including beach profiles (how steep the beaches were), beach material analysis and also longshore drift direction (where the sea was moving the material to). As a group, we also discussed the state of the management schemes and their effectiveness at protecting the land behind.

### The Future is Looking Bright

### **Progress at last with our New Build!**

In the summer of 2022, the old Art, Geography and Religion & Philosophy building was demolished. Since then, the Quad has been surrounded by fences and ground clearance has taken place. Once the fences are taken down, a beautiful sight will meet our eyes...

Recently, I met Mr. Parekh, the Project Manager for the building site at Wanstead High School. His day-to-day role is solving challenges that turn up during this project, and also keeping the school's children and staff safe while building works are taking place during the day.

the triangle of grass on the lower playground hard-stranded in Easter this year, and as well as this the benches which were previously in The Quad will be relocated there. The Quad will be replaced with a more enhanced courtyard, benefiting from new landscape areas for pupils. The new lunch hall will replace the one in the main building which we currently use, which will most likely be used only as an assembly hall. The newly built dining hall is going to be twice the size (404 square metres to be precise), allowing more pupils to be inside the lunch hall to reduce the long queues outside.









The aim of this project is to provide a new three-storey building which will bring a new dance studio and a 25-metre swimming pool to the existing leisure centre, a dining hall and huge kitchen, new classrooms, new toilets, changing rooms and a court-yard which will replace the old one. Many questions have been asked around the school, so I am in the hope that this article will answer most of them...

The pupils of Wanstead High will have their play areas returned, and in an even better state than before. Mr Parekh plans to have

A few more parking spaces will be created in the car park and some dedicated spaces to park our school minibuses. At the moment, the building works are on the second phase, which is Land and Foundation. In this stage, any debris or plants found on the site are removed, and the ground is levelled and prepared for a solid foundation to be dug and installed. Mr Parekh's biggest concern is ensuring the programme does not fall behind and the new buildings are delivered on time.

He also wants to minimise the pollution emitted by the construc-




tion vehicles, and as well the noise caused which could impact the school. Stanley Bragg Architects designed the plans for the new build in 2021, and the construction company contracted is called Jerram Falkus.

It is predicted that this project will be completed by 2025/6 at an


estimated cost of around £18 million. Construction of the main building expected to start at the end of this year, once the foundations are installed. Precise plans will take place to maintain the highest standards throughout construction.

# Year 12 Art Trip to the Barbican Art Gallery

The American painter Alice Neel, born 1900, claimed she was a 'collector of souls'. She chose to portray individuals who were often not the subjects of paintings - black intellectuals, Communist leaders, neighbourhood children from deprived parts of New York - even her local taxi driver! Her work wrestled to capture the essence of a person: who a person is and what they might be when they set aside the role they perform for society. She was also a canny observer of society's effects on the individual: in her words' I wanted to paint what the world had done to them and their retaliation'.

Year 12 pupils were fascinated by the quality of line which changed through the years but also by the unique way Alice Neel captured the personal story of her subjects exposing what they had been through. Pupils took the opportunity to study the works in a focused way by sitting and sketching in the gallery. We then progressed to the Conservatory where pupils were given time to continue their recording-this time focusing on the contrast between the Brutalist Barbican Architecture and the lush foliage of the tropical plants.

### **UKMT Challenge**



Our set one classes from Years 10 & 11 took part in the UKMT challenge which is a competition that encourages mathematical reasoning, precision of thought, and fluency in using basic mathematical techniques to solve interesting problems. The problems on the Intermediate Mathemati-

cal Challenge are designed to make pupils think. Most questions are accessible, however, it still challenges those with more experience.

Our pupils at WHS were entered for the 'intermediate challenge' in the beginning of March. Out of the 89 pupils entered we had;

- 34 awarded Bronze Certificates
- 16 awarded Silver Certificates
- 2 awarded Gold Certificates



#### What is "Robbery"?


Under Section 8 of the Theft Act 1968, a person will be guilty of the criminal offence of robbery if they steal, and immediately before or at the time of doing so, and to do so, they use force on any person or puts or seeks to put any person in fear of being then and there subjected to force.

#### **Fearless**

Fearless is the dedicated youth service of the independent charity Crimestoppers. They provide you with the opportunity to give information about crime 100% anonymously.

You can give information to them by using their online form (https://crimestoppers-uk.org/fearless/what-is-fearless/who-we-are) or by calling Crimestoppers on 0800 555 111

They cannot track your IP address or your phone number. They have no way of knowing who has contacted them.

After receiving your completed form or your call, they will create a report, ensuring it doesn't contain any information that could identify you, and generate a report which is then sent on to the relevant authority with the legal responsibility to review the information that has been passed to them.

### HERE'S 3 THINGS YOU CAN DO:

Tracker apps can help locate your phone if it's lost or stolen. Ask a parent to show you how to set one up.

Record the phone's IMEI number in a seperate place at home. Find this by typing in \*#06#. You'll need to give this number to police if it's stolen.

If you see a robbery or one has just taken place call police on 999. You can still report later on 101 or online. As police officers, our job is to keep you safe and stop people who want to steal property like phones, cash, earphones and even expensive coats or trainers.

You can help us do that by being careful where you use your phone and taking care of cash and other valuable items.

- Don't fight back, it's not worth the risk when a phone can be replaced.
- Tell us if someone robs you or tries to. It's important you get help straight away by dialling 999 using a friend or trus ted adult's phone rather than contacting police when you get home. This gives us the best chance to catch the suspects, recover stolen items and make sure you're safe.

#### **5 TIPS TO KEEP SAFE**

- Keep your phone and valuables out of sight and I in a safe place. Take care when you take them out especially near bus stops and train stations.
- Stay alert and remember earp hones/headphones can distract you from being aware of someone approaching from behind you. Thieves can approach on mopeds, e-scooters and pedal cycles.

- Memorise or keep a note of a parenit/carer's phone number an a separate place in case of emergency.












Pleated, black, knee-length school skirt or plain black regular fitting trousers

Socks, ankle or knee length - white or black socks, or black opaque tights

Shoes – flat, black, of a sensible design

Trainers, trainer type shoes, open or canvas shoes are not acceptable and must not be worn

The school embroidered blazer, tie and pullover can only be purchased from the school outfitter.

All other items of uniform may be purchased elsewhere. However, to keep in line with the school's colour, styles and appearance we would suggest you buy your child's full uniform from the school uniform shop.

#### ► General Uniform Rules

- Make-up need to be subtle. False eyelashes, nail varnish and fake nails are considered excessive and are not permitted.
- The only jewellery permitted in school is one small signet ring, one sleeper or stud in each ear and a simple religious emblem on a necklace worn under the shirt.
   Large diamanté earrings are not permitted. No other body piercing should be displayed.
- 3. Religious headwear should be plain in black, burgundy or white.
- 4. Hair bands must be plain black. Patterned bandanas are not permitted.

- 5. Extreme hair styles or hair colour or those associated with any kind of anti-social activities or groups are not permitted. These change from time to time. The patterned shaving of hair or eyebrows is forbidden.
- It is not permitted for any student to wear any form of cap or hat in the school building. This includes du-rags. A plain black woollen hat can be worn to and from school and at break/lunchtimes when the weather is cold.
- 7. Hooded sports tops or 'hoodies' are not permitted and will be confiscated.
- 8. Trainers, canvas shoes, plimsolls or patterned shoes must not be worn.
- 9. Jeans or tight fit trousers are not permitted.
- 10. Coats and jackets must be plain, and without large patterns or logos, these can be worn in the school building (not in lessons and/or the Dining Hall) as a trial from 3<sup>rd</sup> October 2022.
- 11. Trouser belts must be plain and dark in colour.
- 12. The school has adopted the Halo Code see school website.

Pupils must wear school uniform at all times, including as they arrive at school and depart at the end of the day.

If there are any problems with uniform, temporary or permanent, contact the Head of Year in advance. In addition, the school has a family hardship fund for parents / carers that cannot afford to buy or replace uniform. Please contact the Head of Year to discuss your family's eligibility for this financial support.

Uniform will be reviewed as per government guidance in the summer term.
