## Acting Head of Year 12

e have had a really busy but productive start to Sixth Form life. Year 12 pupils have settled into school routines and expectations very well and it has been a pleasure to see them enthusiastically begin

to make plans for the next two years and beyond.

It was lovely to meet so many of you at our Parents' Information Evening on 11th October where we went through Sixth Form procedures, enrichment opportunities as well as sharing how best to support your child with memory and retention skills -vital for exam success! For those who couldn't attend, the Power-Point Presentation can be found on our school website under the Sixth Form tab.

I am very pleased that so many of our Year 12s have been eager to enrol in a variety of enrichment activities. Forty pupils have signed up to become School Ambassadors who will be called upon to serve and represent at extra-curricular events. Many of our cohort have been selected for the award-winning 'Future Leaders' programme which is run by the Mayor of London. Others have signed up for opportunities and work experience run by the Sutton Trust and Oxford University.

We offer the Extended Qualification Project (EPQ) qualification for pupils to take alongside their A Levels and many of our Year 12s have selected this option after successfully completing a MOOC course run by the University of Bath. The EPQ is worth half an A Level, run by the AQA board and is worth UCAS points. Projects are pupil-driven, giving our pupils the freedom and responsibility to select a topic they are interested in, conduct personal research and make a presentation of findings to an audience. Currently we have pupils researching topics as diverse as the 1980s Miners' Strike and Prison Reform.

Year 12 pupils are required to complete 1 hour of Social Contract per fortnight in Terms 1 and 2 of the academic year. This is a good way to support the school community and can be a boost to personal statements or CVs. The Social Contract session will take place during a study period, lunch time or immediately after school. Year 12 pupils are currently signing up for opportunities with the department/enrichment activity of their choice e.g. assisting the music department with KS3 band practice.

We have a dedicated Google Classroom page (code imnz7om) for Year 12 notices, higher education information and enrichment opportunities. So far, our posts include information on Russell Group universities, Degree Apprenticeships and webinars promoting Women in STEM. It would be a good idea if pupils got into the habit of checking our page regularly or set up alerts so not to miss notices and opportunities.

We have an exciting afternoon planned on the 21st October when pupils will have a session to familiarise themselves with the Spring Pod virtual work experience and university exploration portal followed by an 'Insight from Industry' seminar run by Future Options.

Finally, please may we ask for your support in ensuring that your child:

- Is on time for school each day and with attendance of at least 95%
- Adheres to our formal dress code (full details are on our school website)
- Arrives ready to learn with the correct resources and equipment
- Completes all home learning tasks

#### Please can you:

- Contact the school each day your child is absent
- Ensure your school contact details are updated as necessary
- Offer your child a quiet place to study if possible

### **Head of Year 13**

e have had a very busy but productive start to the term in Year 13. The main focus has been preparing for next steps, starting with our early applicants who had a deadline of 15th October.

In order to support

these pupils, I have been meeting with early applicants (pupils applying for Medicine, Oxbridge, Dentistry and Veterinary Medicine) as well as Law applicants and have liaised with the exams team to discuss entry for admissions tests that their chosen establishment requires. Pupils will have received information about the logistics of these exams if they are to be sat at school and will be sitting these very soon.

Furthermore, on Wednesday 21st September, we invited a Doctor and Cambridge graduate to provide 1:1 20 minute workshops for these early applicants on their personal statement drafts. Pupils were asked to sign up and bring their statement to their session for tailored advice on how to improve these.

On 28th September, we invited Access Wadham College to speak to our early applicants and those requiring admissions tests about the process and how to prepare.

From Wednesday 19th October, we will be holding personal statement drop-in workshops open to all Year 13 pupils to attend from 3.05pm to 4.15pm. We will provide support with re-drafting statements during these sessions and encourage all pupils to bring a hard copy of their statements with them. As a school we have set up an internal deadline of 25th November for UCAS applications to be ready so that we can review applications with pupils before they are sent. In order to ensure we are supporting and guiding all pupils during the entire UCAS application process, we will be checking their online application forms and sending off to UCAS with pupils at school in time for the final deadline on 25th January.

On 21st October, all Year 13 pupils will be off-timetable during Periods 4 and 5. We have invited an external visitor from an organisation called Hundo, to deliver an 'Insight from Industry session' for our pupils. Technology is a key part of all jobs and will continue to be in the future and the educational organisation aims to help pupils access the digital sector. He

will share his career journey, any top tips for future careers, opportunities in the digital sector for jobs and talk about different roles in the sector he works in. We hope this will also provide further insight and opportunity for pupils who may not necessarily want to go to university.







# Henry VIII breaks from Rome


# **Outstanding Geographers**

# Auschwitz-Birkenau

# Understanding The Holocaust

n Thursday 13th October 2022, I was given the opportunity with a classmate to visit Auschwitz-Birkenau, two of the main concentration and extermination camps during the Holocaust. My experiences of Auschwitz was unique and different from every other person over there's experience but before I get into that I want to explain a bit about what I learnt about the Holocaust and Auschwitz.

The Holocaust was an anti-Semitic event that lasted six years from 1939-1945, it stemmed from hate, stereotypes and negative ideologies. My visit to Auschwitz has helped me to understand the depth and the complexity of the Holocaust. It created questions in my mind like::

Is Hitler the only one to blame?
Is every bystander innocent?
How many people can be blamed?

Questions we don't often ask or think about because the Holocaust doesn't affect us, you or me personally weren't involved, so why does it matter?

It is crucial to understand that the Holocaust was not a single random event, it was strategic and built because of hate and anti-Semitism. We learn about the Holocaust because the same ideas that led to 6 million deaths still exist in our world today. The lessons from Auschwitz project does not aim to compare suffering or provide

statistics, by taking part in a project like this you become part of the people who work to re-humanise the Holocaust. When learning about the holocaust it is easy to get lost in figures and statistics. It is up to us to remember that the number we have of 6 million is not just a figure, it is 6 million individual stories of people with families, jobs and lives. Therefore, I would like to speak about Jewish life prior to the war.

Before the war, the Jewish population in Europe was not huge but it was there from 1% in Germany to 10% in Poland. They lived peacefully alongside others, they led normal lives like you or me, they didn't do anything obscenely different, they lived as people, as humans. There is a small town in Poland called Oświęcim, it is where everything began. It once was the largest Jewish community in Poland and Europe with a vibrant lifestyle where Christian's, Jews and the polish community all lived together harmoniously with joint lives, taking part in trade and filling the streets with festivals, what once was the busiest street in Poland with the most famous synagogue in the world was ruthlessly destroyed by the Nazis. Everything went downhill from there. The main camps of Auschwitz are in Oświęcim which is why I chose to talk about the town. Today it is a quiet calm street with no trace of that life, the last Jewish resident sadly passed a few years ago, a

void is left in Oświęcim forever after the Holocaust.

My journey in Auschwitz started in Oświęcim where I saw and felt the solemn atmosphere and emptiness left in the town as civilisation was eventually forced to continue. When I was in Auschwitz I felt a range of emotions, some which I couldn't place, it was hard and definitely overwhelming but it was an experience I felt was necessary to see what hate can do. We often feel that the Holocaust was so long ago it does not relate to us, yet even today people are attacked and hunted for their identity. Seeing the shoes, clothes, ponytails, belongings and personal items of the victims of Auschwitz was devastating and extremely difficult to walk through. When going through the gas chambers I felt chills and it felt like I could smell the gas. It is a chilling experience because Auschwitz was never meant for people to see and the only reason, we can see it is because after the liberation, the Polish Jews decided that they wanted it to be a memorial for people to see and learn about what the entire world turned a blind eye to for 6 years. One thing that really struck me was the book of names, there was a book about 10 metres long full of 4.4 million names of victims who were remembered, 4.4 out of 6 million. Seeing all of these things, the conditions they had to live in and the experiences they had in the camps sparked so many emotions and it really made the Holocaust feel more real because it was no longer just something out of a textbook I was there in person.

We learn about the Holocaust to understand that every individual had a personal life and visiting Auschwitz made the Holocaust more than just an event that happened in the past that we have to learn about, it made it real and provided detail and information about what really happened. On our journey we were joined by a Rabbi, he himself was not a direct victim of the Holocaust however his family was, he told us his story and I want share his story which I was fortunate enough to have heard.

The Rabbi told us, there once was a Polish man who met a Jewish woman, they fell in love and they got married. They lived together happily for 2 months before the SS men came knocking on their door and took him away, he promised her he'd be back. Talks in the town said the Jews were next, a Catholic woman approached the Jewish woman, she gave her a visa and some papers, told her to leave and go far away, the Jewish woman did so, she went to Glasgow where she

welcome to book a slot after school for help with GSCE English. fainted and was rushed to hospital, she found out she was pregnant. She wrote to her husband whom she found out later had been killed. She raised her daughter alone and moved to London with her and made sure she was given an education. That Polish man who was killed was the Rabbi's Grandfather who he never met. The brave Jewish woman who started a new life in a new country and didn't even speak the language, was his grandmother who taught her children to love everyone and to not hate, a woman who lost everything she knew was determined to still spread kindness in a cruel world. This story is just 1 out of 6 million, there is no correct way to feel at Auschwitz, every feeling is valid, the Rabbis story made me emotional, the photos made others emotional and the place made others emotional but the experience is accepting that it happened and learning to teach about it and re-humanise the victims.

I'm going to leave you with a few words from an survivor (originally in Hebrew translated into English):

"You painted the walls with our blood to hide your sins,

the same red that led to our deaths

left your hearts


leaving it dark and blackened.

How often our bloods would mix

Yet so easily you failed to see,

we are the same as you."

# Children with Infectious Diseases, especially Measles, Mumps, Chickenpox and Shingles

One of our pupils received medical treatment that puts them at

increased risk from infectious diseases, especially Measles, Mumps, Chickenpox and Shingles. If they come into contact with anyone suffering from these conditions the pupil requires some protective medication. This has to be given within 72 hours of exposure in order to be effective. Due to the fact a child may be infectious for up to 72 hours before symptoms appear, it is likely the at-risk pupil will be unknowingly exposed.

We would therefore ask that if your child develops Measles, Mumps, Chickenpox or Shingles (or any other infectious disease) that you inform us immediately so that we can ascertain if exposure has occurred and appropriate treatment can be given to the atrisk pupil.

Your child is not at risk from this situation, however the health of our at-risk pupil does depend on your co-operation in this matter and your help will be gratefully appreciated.

Please also inform the school if your child has suffered a fracture or a broken bone as they will need a risk assessment prior to their return to school.







### ► DRESS CODE

Burgundy school blazer with badge embroidered on pocket

Plain, white cotton (cotton/polyester) shirt

School crested tie with year group coloured stripe

Plain, black, school V-necked pullover with crest

Pleated, black, knee-length school skirt or plain black regular fitting trousers

Socks, ankle or knee length - white or black socks, or black opaque tights

Shoes - flat, black, of a sensible design

Trainers, trainer type shoes, open or canvas shoes are not acceptable and must not be worn

The school embroidered blazer, tie and pullover can only be purchased from the school outfitter.

All other items of uniform may be purchased elsewhere. However, to keep in line with the school's colour, styles and appearance we would suggest you buy your child's full uniform from the school uniform shop.

### ► General Uniform Rules

- 1. Make-up needs to be subtle. False eyelashes, nail varnish and fake nails are considered excessive and are not permitted.
- 2. The only jewellery permitted in school is one small signet ring, one sleeper or stud in each ear and a simple religious emblem on a necklace worn under the shirt. Large diamante earrings are not permitted. No other body piercing should be displayed.
- 3. Religious headwear should be plain in black, burgundy or white.

- 4. Hair bands must be plain black. Patterned bandanas are not permitted.
- 5. It is not permitted for any pupil to wear any form of cap or hat in the school building. A plain black woollen hat can be worn to and from school and at break / lunchtimes when the weather is cold.
- 6. Hooded sports tops or 'hoodies' are not permitted and will be confiscated.
- 7. Trainers, canvas shoes, plimsolls or patterned shoes must not be worn.
- 8. Jeans or tight fit trousers are not permitted.
- 9. Coats and jackets must be plain, and without large patterns or logos, these can be worn in the school building (not in lessons and/or the Dining Hall) as a trial from 3rd October 2022.
- 10. Trouser belts must be plain and dark in colour.

Pupils must wear school uniform at all times, including as they arrive at school and depart at the end of the day.

If there are any problems with uniform, temporary or permanent, contact the Head of Year in advance. In addition, the school has a family hardship fund for parents / carers that cannot afford to buy or replace uniform. Please contact the Head of Year to discuss your family's eligibility for this financial support.

The school requires a parent or carer to collect any confiscated items from 3.15pm that day.
